From the **Principal**

Welcome to the 2011 school year. 2010 concluded with three exciting events, Australian Business Week, National Schools Volleyball Cup in Melbourne and the overseas Music Tour to China and Europe. I congratulate all the staff who gave so much of their own time to make these three events so successful for the students.

I was fortunate to join the Music tour which was a credit to the staff and the 69 students. Fifteen parents joined the tour and like me were impressed every day with the maturity, talent and humour of the students. This tour summed up everything that Brighton stands for and underlines our Values: Cooperation, Excellence, Fairness, Integrity, Respect and Responsibility.

The Music Staff (Jeffrey Kong, Craig Bentley, Annie Kwok and Andrew Barrett) gave so much of themselves to prepare for the tour and to be great role models on the tour. Not only did they supervise students, they too had to perform on stage with the students. Sometimes they were all quite tired but 'the show' still went on and they all maintained a highly professional standard.

A highlight of the tour was meeting with Tim Fisher, Australian Ambassador to the Holy See, who was so impressed with the choir's performances he came to the second evening and organised publicity on ABC Radio the following morning in Australia. Jeff Kong returned to Rome and arranged for Tim Fisher to be the guest at the 2011 Elder Hall

Music Spectacular on Saturday 27th August, which will celebrate 35 years of Music at Brighton.

Jeff Kong has also negotiated for the South Australian Governor, Kevin Scarce, to be the Patron of the South Australian Special Interest Music Program – a great coup.

The Community Performing Arts Centre is on schedule due for completion mid March. The official opening will probably be early May to coincide with the arrival of the new Chief Executive of DECS, Mr. Kevin Bartley, from the United Kingdom.

The Year 12 students have made a strong start with the new SACE requirement, the Research Project. It has been exciting hearing about the diverse topics they have chosen.

I urge you to come to the Annual General Meeting on Thursday 10th March at 6.00pm. Yes, we are recruiting Governing Council parent representatives, however, we want to share with

2010 Australian Volleyball

Schools Cup

On Saturday December 4th five Premier Coachline buses left Adelaide for Melbourne. 230 Brighton Special Interest Volleyball students and 50 adult staff travelled to participate in what has become the largest schools sporting event in the Southern Hemisphere. In 2010 123 schools from Australia and New Zealand competed.

The Brighton Secondary School Volleyball Program returned home 7 days later with 1 gold, 5 silver,4 bronze medals and four 4th places. 14 of the 24 teams we entered ranked in the top 4 for their age group across Australia.

Our success in the Divisional competition was particularly impressive and highlights the strength we have in the program across all age groups and year levels.

Two outstanding examples were in the Open Boys age group where we achieved a

- Silver in Open Honours
- Silver in Open Div 1
- Gold in Open Div 2

Likewise in the Junior Girls (mostly year 8's) we achieved

- Bronze in U15 Div 1
- 4th in U15 Div 2
- Silver in Under 14's.

Unfortunately we missed the opportunity to win 4 Australian Champion School trophies in a row. (This trophy is calculated on the 6 best placed teams from each school).

Heathfield High School won in 2010 with 613 points and Brighton was 2nd with 578 points. Congratulations go to their staff, particularly David Eldridge and Stuart Scott and the Heathfield students for their hard work.

Now 2011 brings on the challenge for all of our Brighton SIV students to work hard in lessons and in every competition opportunity so that we can be in the best position to regain the National title once again.






Music Tour

Good Night's

Sleep

Getting a good night's sleep often comes down to routines. Avoiding late-night technology use and keeping a regular sleep schedule are two important techniques as children head back to school. Recent studies found that adolescents used multiple forms of technology late into the night, including gaming systems, cell phones, and computers. As a result, they had difficulty staying awake and alert throughout the day.

Any factor that decreases the quality or quantity of sleep will lead to difficulty with school performance and poor behaviour problems. When children stay up late at night texting in bed or playing computer games, they are increasing their risk of neuro-cognitive problems. According to research, having a regular bedtime was the most consistent predictor of positive developmental outcomes in four-year olds. In this 8,000-person sample, language, reading and maths scores were higher in children whose parents reported enforcing regular bedtimes.

Disrupting the normal sleep pattern, whether with technology or not, can reset the brain's circadian clock. A common problem, staying awake late and sleeping-in on the weekends, can make it difficult to fall asleep and wake-up during the week, so it is important to maintain a consistent schedule all week long.

The number of nightly sleep hours required by children varies by age. In general, five-year olds should get 11 hours of sleep, nine-year olds need 10 hours and 14 year olds require at least 9 hours. If the child is not alert and functioning properly during the day, sleep length should be gradually increased or decreased, or the bedtime routine should be adjusted.

For better sleep, it is important to maintain a routine bedtime pattern to prepare the brain for sleep. Exciting, high energy activity should be avoided within one hour before lights-out.

Pre-bedtime activities like taking a bath, teeth-brushing, and reading a non-stimulating book signal to the brain that it's time to sleep. Exercise, caffeine, and sugary foods should be avoided.

The ideal sleeping atmosphere is a dark quiet room that is kept below 20 degrees. Technology should be removed from the bedroom.

Insufficient sleep and poor sleep habits have been linked to health problems such as obesity, cardiovascular disease, diabetes, depression, moodiness, irritability, reduced memory functioning, and delayed reaction time.
